What Is World Book Day?

World Book Day is an annual celebration. This means that it happens every year. In the United Kingdom, World Book Day happens on the first Thursday of March. In other parts of the world, World Book Day always happens on 23rd April.



World Book Day is a charity event. It is a day where everybody gets to focus on reading. Every year, on World Book Day, each child in the UK is given a £1 voucher to spend on a book of their own.

When Did World Book Day Start?

The idea for World Book Day was thought up by a group called UNESCO. They are a group responsible for making sure that everyone around the world gets a chance to learn. In 1995, UNESCO decided to make a day that focused on reading. The very first World Book Day was celebrated around the world in April 1995. It is now celebrated in around 100 different countries.

Did You Know?

- The date of World Book Day changes every year.
- Anyone who loves books can take part in World Book Day.
- You can take your £1 book voucher to any bookshop and swap it for one of the special World Book Day books on offer.



Why Is Reading Important?

Reading is a very important skill and it is something that you will need to be able to do for your whole life. Without being able to read, simple tasks, such as going shopping or reading a letter, become impossible. How will you know what ingredients to put into a cake if you cannot read the recipe? How will you know where the bus goes to if you can't read the sign?

Reading gives you the chance to live your life however you choose but some children are not lucky enough to learn to read at school. World Book Day can be a great chance to raise money for charities, such as Book Aid International. These charities work with children in less fortunate countries. They give them books and teach them to read so that they can do whatever they choose to do in life.

World Book Day is an annual celebration. In the United Kingdom, World Book Day happens on the first Thursday of March. However, in other parts of the world, World Book Day always happens on 23rd April. 23rd April was chosen because it is the same date that many famous authors have died on.



World Book Day is a one-day charity event, on which everybody gets to focus on books, authors and reading. Every year, on World Book Day, each child in the UK is given a £1 voucher to spend on a book of their own. This is to encourage a love of reading from an early age.

World Book Day Beginnings

The idea for World Book Day was originally thought up by an organisation called UNESCO. UNESCO are responsible for making sure that everyone around the world gets a chance to learn. In 1995, UNESCO created an annual celebration of reading and the very first World Book Day was held around the world in April of this year. It is now celebrated in around 100 different countries and, each year, UNESCO chooses a different city to be the centre of their World Book Day celebrations.

Did You Know?

- World Book Day is celebrated on a different date every year.
- Around 15 million book tokens are sent out each year in the UK, which can be swapped for a free £1 book in many bookshops.
- Many people dress up as their favourite storybook characters on World Book Day.



The Importance of Reading

Reading is a vital skill and something you will need to be able to do for your whole life. Without being able to read, simple tasks, such as reading the ingredients to bake a cake or reading a letter about bills, become impossible.

Reading allows you to live your life however you choose to but learning to read is a luxury that some children are not lucky enough to experience. They provide them with books and teach them to read in order to give them the best chance of success in the future.

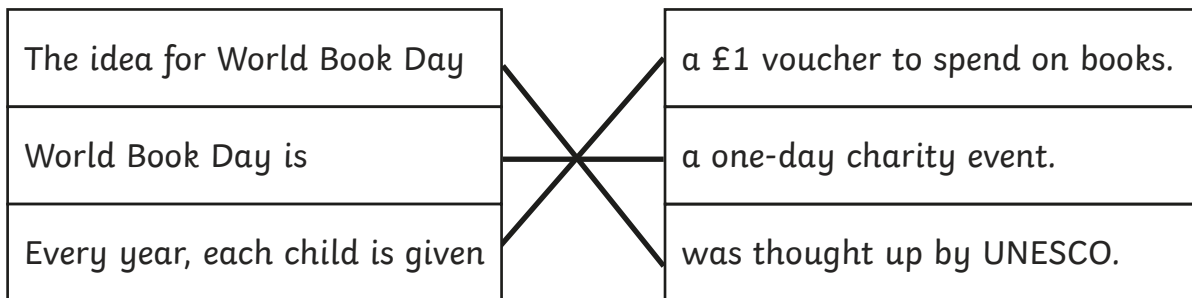

However, due to the celebration of St George's Day on the same date, the United Kingdom celebrates World Book day on the first Thursday of March instead.

World Book Day is a one-day charitable festival, with a focus on books, authors and reading. It is an opportunity for people to share their favourite books with others, explore new texts and learn more about their favourite authors. Every year, on World Book Day, each child in the UK is given a £1 voucher to spend on a book of their choice, in order to encourage a love of reading from an early age.

The idea for World Book Day was originally created by an organisation called UNESCO, who are responsible for ensuring that everyone around the world gets a chance to learn. In 1995, UNESCO created an annual celebration of reading. Therefore, the very first World Book Day was held around the world in April of that year. It is now celebrated in around 100 different countries, with UNESCO choosing a different city each year to be the centre of their World Book Day celebrations.

Did You Know?

- 171 million people could be able to free themselves from poverty if they were able to leave school with basic reading skills.
- For every £2 donated on World Book Day, Book Aid International can send a new reading book to a school where children do not have enough books to learn to read.

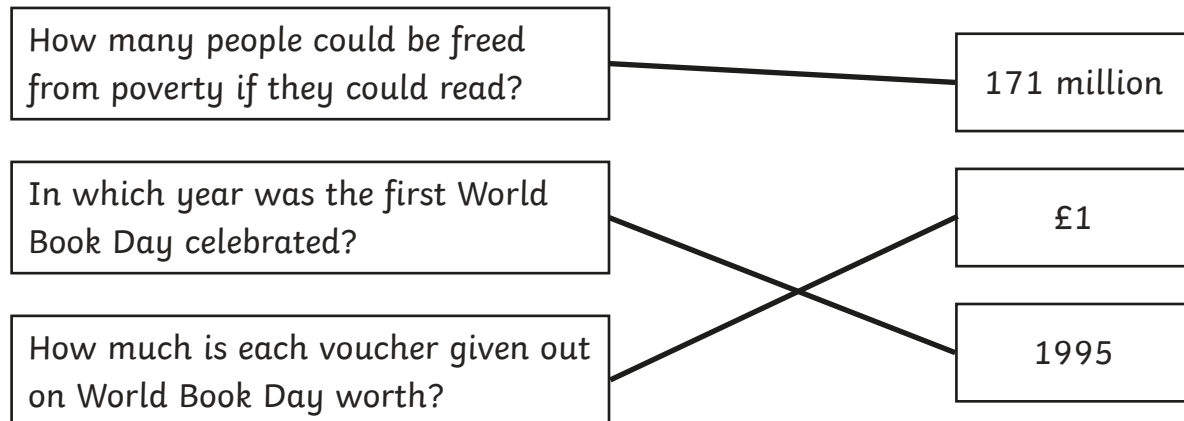
